Scholefield & Associates, a downtown construction law firm, is introducing the newest member of its practice. A salesman.

Meet Johnny Manriquez, who will serve as the firm's first "sales attorney" tasked with scouting out new clients and building business relationships.

Manriquez received his law degree from California Western School of Law in 2001 and is admitted to practice in California, the District of Columbia and before the United States Patent and Trademark Office. Manriquez earned his master's degree in health care administration and an undergraduate degree in biological studies from Loma Linda University.

The move is unusual for a law firm because partners have traditionally been the ones engaged in so-called "rainmaking."

Partner Pam Scholefield called it a necessary step in encouraging business growth. It was an idea she borrowed from her past. Before entering the legal arena, Scholefield had a 10-year career with General Electric.

"In my experience, any company that tries to sell professional products or services generally has a sales person for the industry they're in," she said.

Introducing the concept to the legal field hasn't come without scrutiny, however. Even the firm acknowledged in a recent press release that when Manriquez's position was announced "there were as many detractors pointing out flaws as there were supporters applauding their bold move."



Bryan Weaver, an in-house consultant to the law firm, contended that the position will benefit the firm's growth plans, which include expanding into Orange County.

"We're trying to develop with our clients a lifetime relationship where it's not like one legal matter and they're gone," he said.

Just last week the firm moved its offices from 1901 First Ave. to 501 W. Broadway to be closer to the courts.
